Ministry of Inter Provincial Coordination was created initially on 24-12-1971, when it was headed by the Prime Minister himself. With intermittent interruptions, the Prime Minister of Pakistan approved the creation of a full Inter Provincial Coordination Division in the Cabinet Secretariat w.e.f. 19<sup>th</sup> March, 2007. The IPC related functions of the Cabinet Division were transferred to the Inter Provincial Coordination Division at the time of its creation. Subsequently, it was made a full fledged Ministry w.e.f. 3<sup>rd</sup> November, 2008. Due to 18<sup>th</sup> Amendment, the responsibilities of the Ministry of IPC have increased. Necessary amendments have been made in the Rules of Business, 1973 accordingly.

## **VISION**

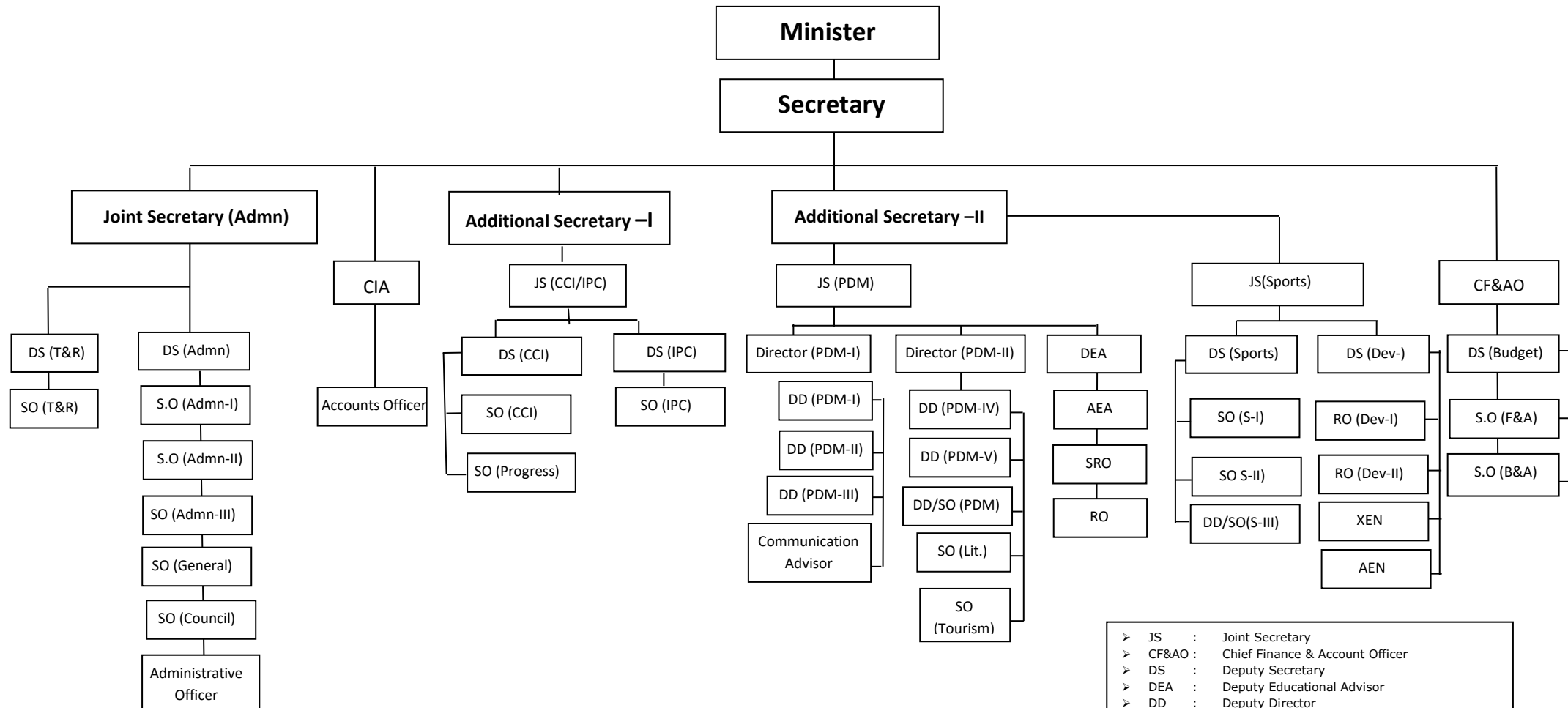

## **5. COUNCIL OF COMMON INTEREST WING**

The CCI Wing of IPC Division has been providing secretarial support to the Council of Common Interests (CCI) since March, 2010 when the Prime Minister of Pakistan approved the transfer of all secretarial work of the CCI from Cabinet Division to IPC Division. The wing is supervised by the Additional Secretary (IPC/CCI) and is headed by the Joint Secretary (CCI), and assisted by Deputy Secretary (CCI) and two Section Officers i.e. Section Officers (CCI) and (Progress).

2. The Council of Common Interests (CCI) is a constitutional body set up under Article 153 of the Constitution of Islamic Republic of Pakistan, 1973. The passage of 18<sup>th</sup> Constitutional Amendment has further strengthened its purview through the expanded role of CCI whereby important subjects relating to Federation have been added in the Federal Legislative List, Part-II, for consideration of and decision by the CCI (**Annex-I**).

3. The forum is headed by the Prime Minister of Islamic Republic of Pakistan as its Chairman. The Chief Ministers of Provinces and three Members nominated by the Prime Minister from the Federal Government, are its members. Present composition of the Council is available at [www.ipc.gov.pk](http://www.ipc.gov.pk). The Council is an icon of federalism in the Country and provides the Federating Units (Provinces) an equal participation in the affairs of the federation. As per Rules of Procedure of CCI, 2010 (available at [www.ipc.gov.pk](http://www.ipc.gov.pk)), the Secretary IPC Division is the Secretary of the CCI.

4. In terms of Article 153(1) read with Article 154(2), the President of Islamic Republic of Pakistan appoints the Council on the advice of the Prime Minister of Pakistan within 30 days of taking the oath of Prime Minister. The CCI is responsible to the Majlis-e-Shoora (Parliament). Its reports are annually laid before both the houses under Article 153(4). Annual Reports from 2010-11 to 2019-20 have already been laid before both houses of the Parliament i.e. the Senate and the National Assembly. The same are available at [www.ipc.gov.pk](http://www.ipc.gov.pk).

### **5.1 FUNCTIONS OF THE COUNCIL OF COMMON INTERESTS**

5. In accordance with Article 154, the Council is responsible to formulate and regulate policies in relation to the matters enumerated in Part-II of Federal Legislative List (FLL) and to exercise supervision and control over related institutions. The decisions of the CCI are appealable only in the Joint Session of the Parliament.

6. Article 155 of the Constitution extends the purview of CCI to the resolution of a dispute amongst federation and the federating units or area's governments regarding their rights on water from any natural source or reservoir and authorizes the Federal or the Provincial Government concerned to make a complaint to CCI. The CCI can either decide or recommend to the President to set up a Commission consisting of persons having knowledge and



experience in irrigation, engineering, administration, finance and law under the Pakistan Commissions of Inquiry Act, 1956.

7. As regards “Electricity”, the Article 157 of the Constitution while authorizing Federal Government to construct a hydro-electric or thermal power installation in any province in consultation with that province, also authorizes the Provincial Governments to draw bulk supply from National Grid for transmission and distribute within the province; levy taxes on consumption; construct power houses and grid stations; lay transmission lines and also to determine electricity tariff within the Province. In case of any dispute in the matter, the Federal or Provincial Government can approach the CCI for resolution of the dispute.

## 5.2 **MEETINGS OF THE COUNCIL:**

8. In accordance with Article 154(3) of the Constitution, it is mandatory for the Council to meet at least once in ninety days. During 2019-20, the Council convened one meeting on 23<sup>rd</sup> December, 2019 having lengthy list of agenda items and took decisions in the matters relating to the Federation, and the provinces, as mentioned below:-

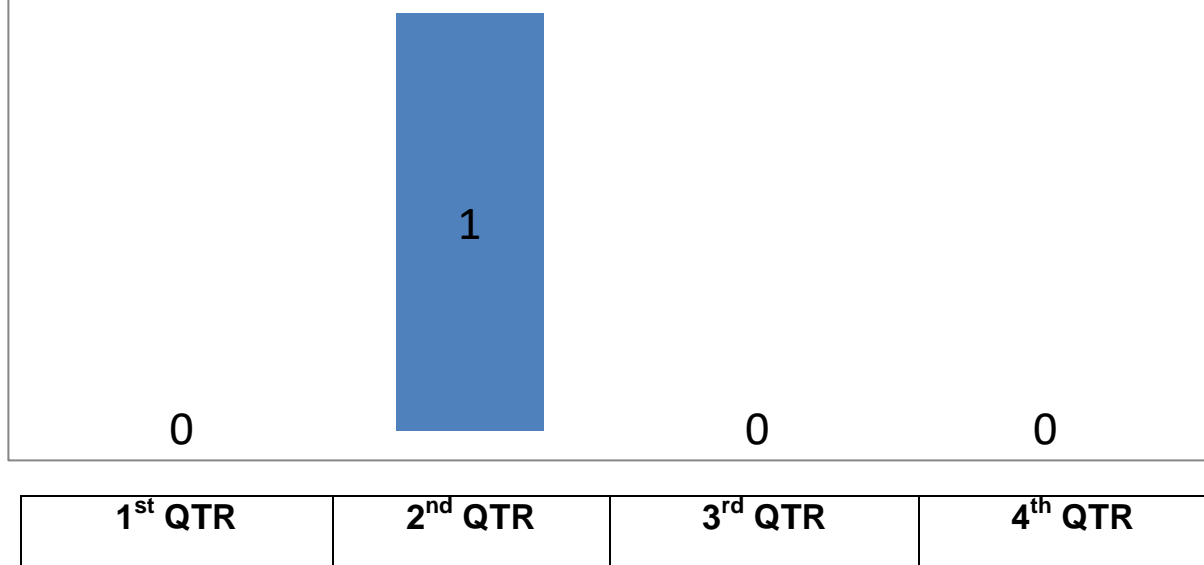

#### **5.4 IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS**

10. In terms of Rule 11 of the Rules of Procedure of the CCI, 2010 (available at [www.ipc.gov.pk](http://www.ipc.gov.pk)), implementation of the decisions of the CCI rests with the sponsoring Ministries at Federal level and Provincial Governments at provincial level respectively. The CCI Wing (Section Officer Progress) monitors the implementation of the decisions and reports the status to CCI from time to time in its meetings.

**Purview of the CCI**  
**(Federal legislative List part-II)**

1. Railways;
2. Mineral oil and natural gas, liquids and substances declared by Federal law to be dangerously inflammable;
3. Development of industries, where development under Federal control is declared by Federal law to be expedient in the public interest; institutions, establishments, bodies and corporations administered or managed by the Federal Government immediately before the commencing day, including Water and Power Development Authority and Pakistan Industrial Development Corporation and all undertakings, projects and schemes of such institutions, establishments, bodies and corporations; industries, projects and undertakings owned wholly or partially by the Federation or by a corporation set up by the Federation;
4. Electricity;
5. Major ports, that is to say, the declaration and delimitation of such ports, and the constitution and powers of port authorities therein;
6. All regulatory authorities established under a Federal law;
7. National planning and national economic coordination including planning and coordination of scientific and technological research;
8. Supervision and management of public debt;
9. Census;
10. Extension of the powers and jurisdiction of members of a police force belonging to any Province to any area in another Province, but not so as to enable the police of one Province to exercise powers and jurisdiction in another Province without the consent of the Government of that Province; extension of the powers and jurisdiction of members of a police force belonging to any Province to railway areas outside that Province;
11. Legal, medical and other professions;
12. Standards in institutions for higher education and research, scientific and technical institutions;
13. Inter-provincial matters and co-ordination;
14. Council of Common Interests;
15. Fees in respect of any of the matters specified in Part-II of the Federal Legislative List but not including fees taken in any court;

16. Offenses against laws with respect to any of matters in Part-II of the Federal Legislative List;
17. Inquiries and statistics for the purposes of any of the matters in Part-II of the Federal Legislative List;
18. Matters incidental or ancillary to any matter enumerated in Part-II of the Federal Legislative List;
19. Complaints as to interference with water supplies (Article 155);
20. Implementation of the directions given by the Parliament for action by the Council under Article 154(6);
21. Submission of Annual Report to both Houses of Parliament (Article 153(4); and
22. Resolution of disputes with respect to construction of Hydro electric station in any Province [Article 157(3)].

## **6: TOURISM SECTION**

As a mandate to handle matters pertaining to Department of Tourist Services (DTS) in Islamabad is attached with this Ministry.

The detailed performance related to tourism during 2019-20 is as under:

- Corresponded and coordinated with Ministries/Divisions/Provincial Governments on tourism related matters.
- Corresponded in respect of annual membership contribution with PATA, IOTO, and WTO through M/o Foreign Affairs for development of travel and tourism.
- Dealt with the function of tourism to share knowledge, experience and resources among the different countries in respect of tourism cooperation.
- MoU on cooperation in the field of tourism with Republic of Turkey was signed on 14<sup>th</sup> Feb, 2020. The Federal Cabinet has accorded approval for entering into negotiations with republic of Sudan and Republic of Kazakhstan,
- MoUs with different countries on cooperation in the field of tourism has been initiated and after getting views/comments from all stakeholders i.e Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Economic Affairs Division, Punjab, Sindh, KPK, Balochistan, AJK and GB were sent to Law and Justice Division for vetting. After vetting, they are under process for negotiations (**Annex-A**).

- PDM wing liaise with Department of Tourist Services (DTS) on matters related to travel agencies and tourist operators.
- Conducted meetings with stakeholders to review the implementation status of Joint Plan of Action under Strategic Economic Framework (SEF) between Pakistan and Turkey.
- Joint Working Groups have been constituted for the implementation of Agreements/MoUs with various countries.

#### **6.4. POST DEVOLUTION MATTERS (PDM) WING**

During Financial Year 2019-20, Post Devolution Matters (PDM) Wing acted as a secretariat as Functional Committee on Devolution process. This wing has performed the function of Youth Exchange Program to share knowledge, experience and resources between the two countries in respect of youth development. The detailed performance of PDM Wing during 2019-20 is as under: -

- Correspond and liaise with Ministries / Divisions / Provincial Governments on Post Devolution Matters.
- Agenda items along-with working papers regarding the post Devolution issues were prepared for the meetings of various forums such as Functional Committee on Devolution Process, Senate Standing Committee on IPC, and National Assembly Standing Committee on IPC.
- Necessary information along-with supporting documents specially related to proceedings of Implementation Commission are being provided to Parliaments / Divisions / Departments such as National Assembly Secretariat, Senate Secretariat, Supreme Court / High Court and other Divisions / Departments as per available record of the wing.
- On the advice of Ministry of Foreign Affairs this Ministry processed MoU with Republic of Korea. The Federal Cabinet had accorded approval for entering into negotiation with Republic of Korea.
- The Cultural Exchange Program is being added as a section of the MoUs being developed by the Ministry of Information Broadcasting and National Heritage with the Republic of Bulgaria, Republic of Portugal, Turkmenistan, people's Democratic Republic of Algeria and Mauritius.
- MoUs with neighboring countries like Bangladesh, Maldives, Bhutan, Nepal and Iran on cooperation in the field of youth development are under process for initializing negotiations.
- Cabinet has accorded approval for signing of agreement / MoU on youth Development with Federal Nigeria and Afghanistan. Ministry of Foreign Affairs has been requested to inform this Ministry about the date and venue for signing of the agreement / MoU.
- MoUs with Turkey and Tunisia on cooperation in the field of youth development are also under process for initializing negotiations
- Agreed and endorsed articles of MoUs for cooperation in the field of Youth Development with Republic of Kenya and Palestine.
- In pursuance of the visit of the Prime Minister to China from 2-5 November, 2018, one of the important outcomes was to celebrate 2019 as "Year of Friendship sister provinces / cities. Accordingly, the Chinese People's Association of Friendship with Foreign

Countries (CPAFFC) and Pakistan's Mission in Beijing jointly organized the Forum on Cooperation between China and Pakistan Friendship Provinces and Cities on 28 March 2019 in Beijing with the theme "Deepen Practical Cooperation, Promote Common Development." The Forum was attended by a 22-members delegation from Pakistan led by Dr. Fehmida Mirza, Minister for Inter Provincial Coordination including Mr. Muhammad Basharat Raja, Provincial Minister for local Government of the Punjab, Mr. Zahoor Ahmad Buledi, Provincial Minister of Balochistan, Mr. Farman Ali, Minister for Local Government and Rural Development, Gilgit-Baltistan along with District Nazims/Mayors and Provincial Secretaries of Local Government Departments. From Chinese side, a 62-members delegation led by Mr. Zhang Chunlin Executive, Vice Governor, Xinjiang Uygur participated in the meeting.

- During this Forum following three Agreements/Letter of intent were signed:
  - ✓ Puyang and Gawadar
  - ✓ Urumqi and Karachi
  - ✓ Xi'an and Multan.
- In these agreements two sides agreed to make concerted effort, on the basis of equality and mutual benefit, to promote people- to-people friendly contacts and economic and trade interflow between the two cities, and actively carry out exchanges and cooperation in the field of agriculture, science and technology, culture, education, health, personnel, etc. a consensus was also developed that the two sides shall give priority to the education and health cooperation, support education and health institutions to carry one-to-one exchanges and cooperation.

## 8: IPC SECTION

### 8.1 INTER PROVINCIAL COORDINATION COMMITTEE (IPCC):

Inter Provincial Coordination Committee (IPCC) was first set up on 8<sup>th</sup> November, 1992. Its composition underwent many changes since then. The mandate of this Committee is to promote uniformity of approach in formulation of policies and their implementation by the Provinces and the Federal Government, in all fields of common national concern. The Committee had been instrumental in various important decisions of national significance and resolution of contentious issues amicably. The Committee has held 28 meetings since 1993. Preparations for the next meeting of the IPCC are underway.

## **COMPOSITION OF THE IPCC:**

2. To achieve the purpose of coordination and harmony between Federation and Federating Units/Provinces, the Prime Minister was pleased to approve the re-constitution of the Inter Provincial Coordination Committee (IPCC) on 26<sup>th</sup> April, 2011 the latest following composition is as under:-

i. Minister for IPC	Chairman
ii. Chief Minister of Provinces	Members

## **TORS OF IPCC:**

- a. General Coordination between the Federal Government and Provinces in economic, social and administrative fields.
- b. Promoting uniformity of approach in formulation of policies and their implementation by the Provinces and the Federal Government in all fields of common national concern.
- c. Discussion of policy issues emanating from the Provinces which have administrative or economic implications for the country as a whole.
- d. Any other matter referred by a Province or any of the Ministry or Divisions of the Federal Government.

## **MAJOR ASSIGNMENT PERFORMED BY THE IPC WING**

The major assignments performed by the IPC Wing during financial year 2019-20 are as under:

-

1. Coordinated with provincial and relevant Federal Ministries to dispose-of a number of cases pertaining to the Senate and National Assembly Business. Also processed various Joint Resolutions adopted by the Provincial Governments / Assemblies.
2. Coordinated with all Provincial Governments for seeking their views/comments for " Taxes Levied on the Transfer of Immovable Properties by Federal Government (Board of Revenue, Punjab.)"
3. Coordinated with all Provincial Governments for seeking their views/comments for "Devolution of Institutions.
4. Efforts were made with the Provincial Governments for seeking their comments/views on "Non-Realization of dues amounting to Rs. 79.297 Million from provincial government on

account of aerial spray of operations by the department of Plant Protection Ministry of National Food Security & Research.”

5. Efforts were made seeking reports from different Ministries/Divisions/ Departments of the Federal Government on the Resolutions/ Cell Attention Notices received from Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.
6. Coordinated with Provincial Governments for implementation of Decision of Cabinet and provided support to Science and Technology Division to digitalize the Gardawari system in order to keep a real time record of cultivation of agricultural products.
7. (TAPI Gas Pipelines Project Heads of Terms of host Government agreement).
8. Besides, coordinated a number of miscellaneous matters with various Ministries/ Divisions as well as Provincial Government during the period are in proves.

## **9. TRAINING & RESEARCH WING**

### **9.1. FEDERAL LAND COMMISSION**

#### **BRIEF OF ORGANIZATION**

The Federal Land Commission is statutory body of the Federal Government of Pakistan created on 3<sup>rd</sup> January, 1973 through an Act of the parliament by inserting Para 4-A in the Land Reforms Regulation, 1972 (MLR-115) and then reconstituted under land reforms Act, 1977. FLC is a quasi judicial forum provided with the revisionary jurisdiction to hear and decide the matters pertaining to Land Reforms of any nature. This judicial forum consists of Registry and Legal Sections to assist and manage the Court work. Provincial Inspection Teams located at four provinces also assist the Courts.

#### **OBJECTIVE/ACTIVITIES.**

The objectives of the Land Reforms were to effectively breakup the iniquitous concentration of landed wealth in a few hands, reduce income disparities, increase agriculture production, reduce un-employment. Land reforms were also intended to cut down the holdings of big landlords. As per policy of the Government, Federal Land Commission, like other organizations, has taken various steps for socio economic uplift of the poor peasants. The socio-economic change at the grass roots level is the top most Priority of the present government. It will effectively improve living condition of the poor farmers in the country bringing economic revolution in their lives as they will be physical owners of agriculture land. This will also boost the standard of living and increase food production, as well as reduce the import bill of food items.

#### **PERFORMANCE / ACHIEVEMENTS**

As a quasi-judicial forum, Federal Land Commission has decided 61 Land Reforms cases during the stipulated period. There are 772 Land Reforms cases pending before the Superior Courts. According to the data collected by the Federal Land Commission from the Provinces, the position of the land readily available for disposal/allotment as on 30.06.2020 **(Annex-A)**.

**b. Curricula Revision of 5 years DVM Degree Program**

A meeting of PVMC National DVM Curriculum Revision Committee (NCRC) was held on 13 & 14 February 2020 at HEC Regional Center, Lahore for the revision of Five Years DVM degree curriculum. Such periodic revision is aimed at bringing the curriculum at par with international standards, domestic needs and to format a comprehensive DVM curriculum. 46 members of the committee actively participated in the meeting from all over the country. A new course in “Bio-risk Management” has been included in the revised curriculum to cater for the existing needs.

The Revised Curriculum has now been printed and dispatched to all the Veterinary institutions as well as Provincial Livestock & Dairy Development Departments. The copies of the revised curriculum have also been dispatched to HEC.

**c. Registration of Veterinary Students / Veterinary Teaching Faculty / Veterinary & AH Practitioner.**

- i. 2052 x veterinary students of accredited universities and 65 x faculty members registered.
- ii. 1042 x veterinary graduates were registered during the period.
- iii. 255 x registrations renewed, Nil x Local Experience Certificates and 12 x Letters of Good Professional Standing were issued to veterinarians during the period.

**10: PAKISTAN SPORTS BOARD**

The Pakistan Sports Board was established as a body corporate under the Ministry of Education through the sports (Development and Control) Ordinance, 1962 as a corporate body for the purpose of promoting and developing uniform standards of sports competitions Pakistan comparable to the standards prevailing internationally and regulating and controlling sports in Pakistan.

2. Pakistan Sports Board under the Ministry of Inter Provincial Coordination is the supreme authority to control and promote sports in the country and also act as executing agency to implement the government policies.

3. Pakistan Sports Board has wide range of sporting facilities at its Headquarters and coaching centers at Provincial Headquarters. These facilities are primarily used for national training camps and holding of various national and international competitions. In addition, these facilities are also allowed to general public on normal membership basis.

4. The Government is determined to promote sports culture in Pakistan and provide all possible financial and administrative support to the affiliated sports organizations in Pakistan.

5. Pakistan's Sports contingent consisted of 253 members participated in the 13<sup>th</sup> South Asian Games, Kathmandu and Pokhara, Nepal from 01-10 December, 2019 in which they stood at 4<sup>th</sup> position after getting 132 medals (32 Gold, 41 Silver and 59 Bronze medals).
